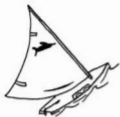

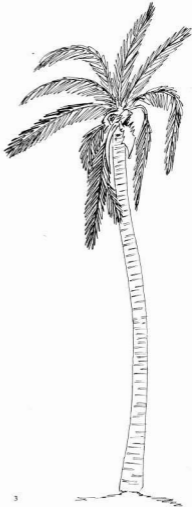

Melissa's sights are set. Where else but on a career in education?

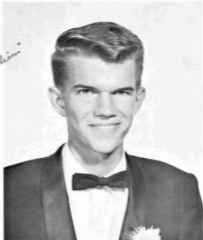

As you might expect, Sue likes to cook and sew. She makes many of her own clothes; she can turn out mouth-watering cookies and cakes or a full-course dinner.

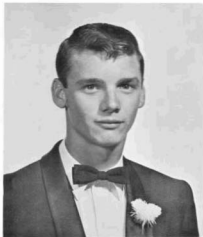

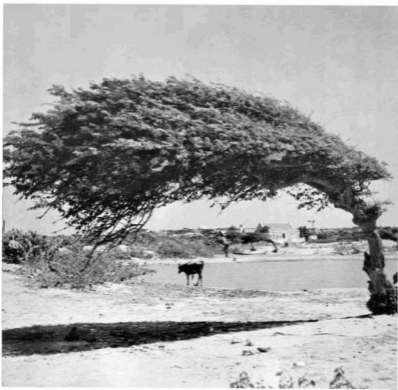

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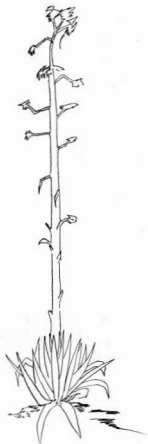
